CALENDAR

Shinsen or food offerings are presented to the *kami* and may vary according to the shrine, the *kami* honored, geographic location or the occasion of worship.

Shinsen basically consists



The shrine's first Dragon Fruits were offered during the July *Tsukinamisai* monthly ceremony. of water, salt, rice, sake.

For ceremonies or festivals - additions of *mochi* rice cakes, different varieties and colors of rice, fish, birds, animals, mountain, field and sea vegetables, fruits and sweets are usually added to the basic items.

The Shinsen is prepared by the priest with meticulous care before each ceremony. Shinsen are placed on Oshiki small trays or Sanbo stands

The offered food is usually eaten after the ceremony or festival with those who have attended

In Buddhism, the offerings do not include meats or alcohol.

IHS was planning to acquire a building at 65 Beretania Street, but was met with vast opposition



from the neighboring residents and businesses.


The Center is scheduled to open in September and will provide short-term housing and services including medical treatment for the displaced who have been infected with COVID-19.

According to the National Alliance to End Homelessness, at the end of 2019, there were 6,530

people homeless on any given night in Hawaii.

The homeless population has been slowly moving to Olomea Street - in front of the shrine.

Bulky trash has been left on Olomea everyday this month, leaving Rev. Takizawa to clean the area several times a day.









Maintenance



Hot summer weather brings a brand new crop of weeds to lawns and cracks in the asphalt.



Cans of decades old paint was prepped for discarding in early July. Paint was poured into a cardboard box lined with newspaper and allowed to dry one layer at a time until it hardened completely.

Leftover gray paint was recycled by painting the shrine walkway and steps.

The shrine exterior was washed and prepped on July 10. Cracks in the concrete were filled with putty and uneven surfaces grinded.

On July 11 and 12, the walkway and steps were given a fresh coat of paint.
