The shrine was desecrated by a vandal on September 14 at about 2:00 am.

Early Wednesday morning, a vandal tore off the sliding door moldings on the Olomea Street side of the shrine and snuck in.

The hour-long security footage shows a lone male attempting to break the doorknob to gain entry into the office. He is also seen rummaging through the desk outside of the office and other areas of the shrine,

The wooden *misu* curtains



were torn - a crime that will cost the shrine about \$5000 to replace.

It's disheartening and a painful reminder that even a church is not off limits to crooks.

A police report has been filed and if caught, the vandal will be prosecuted for property damages.
